

LET'S PLAN AND BUDGET

How to Develop and Fund Your Crew/Ship Program

Creating an exciting program for every Venturer is key to a successful year! Here's how to get started:

- Look for events put on by your district and council. These events are easy to attend and fun because they bring together youth from many nearby crews.
 - They include family camping opportunities, summer camps, helpful training courses, fall hayrides, and many more!
 - Find them on our Event Calendar stlbsa.org/calendar
 - In the calendar menu, select "council" to see all events and "district" to see more events near you.
 - What traditional crew activities will you include?
 - What resources do you have in your crew? Are there parents who work at locations where you could do activities?
 - What are some fun activities you may want to include, however big or small, like picnics, a trip to Six Flags, weekend campouts, etc.?
- Next, brainstorm fun activities, adventures, and experiences your crew could have this year. Include all the youth and parents, if you can, to get the most and best ideas.
- After that, your Crew committee can review all the suggestions, narrow down to the
 activities that make sense for your unit, and plan on when they make the most sense to
 do.
- Lastly, communicate it to your families the plan. You can do a simple list with dates shared via email and at the crew/ship meetings, or you can get creative and produce and share Facebook events, a google calendar, or use some other medium.

MEMBERSHIP

We believe that Scouting is the best leadership and character development program for youth and strive to ensure that every youth in every community has the opportunity to join. As a leader in your Crew or Ship, you can ensure other families in your community receive that invitation, while also ensuring that your unit grows and continues to thrive and provide life changing program for young adults.

How to grow your crew or ship

Most youth join Venturing crews or Sea Scout ships through peer to peer recruitment or through a partner Scouts BSA troop.

Best practices to ensure your crew or ship is growing are:

- Build a relationship with the local Scouts BSA troop(s) so that when their Scouts are interested in moving on and doing more high adventure, they already are familiar and comfortable with your unit.
- Host a open house every year. Families' locations and schedules are ever changing, so some Scouts will join your crew because they are new to the community or are looking for new and different activities.
- Encourage Scouts to recruit their friends, perhaps by having every Scout invite a friend to attend a certain activity or event with the crew or ship.
- Host a booth at the local high school promoting Venturing / Sea Scouting activities.

PROTECTING OUR YOUTH CAN ONLY BE ACHIEVED BY EVERYONE COMMITTING TO THAT PROTECTION.

Scouting America places the highest importance on providing a secure environment for all Scouts. Youth Protection Training is required for all registered volunteers-regardless of position- and must be completed every year. However, you do not have to be registered member of Scouting America to take the training. Every parent involved in Scouting is encourage to complete the course which is available 24/7 at my.scouting.org

- No new leader can be registered without first completing the training.
- No unit may re-charter without all leaders current on their Youth Protection Training.
- Two registered adult leaders at least 21 years of age are required at all Scouting activities, including all meetings. There must be a registered female adult leader at least 21 years of age in every unit serving females and at all events where female youth are present.

ALL INJURIES, ILLNESSES, OR INCIDENTS THAT OCCUR DURING OFFICIAL SCOUTING ACTIVITIES MUST BE REPORTED WITHIN 24–48 HOURS TO THE "SAFE SCOUTING SPECIALIST" WITHIN GREATER ST. LOUIS AREA SCOUTING OR YOUR DISTRICT EXECUTIVE.


SPECIAL NEEDS AWARENESS TRAINING

National Youth Leadership Training

NYLT is advance training for youth leaders in Scouts BSA troops and Venturing crews. Through this week long outdoor training conducted during summer camp, male and female youth members grow and improve their leadership skills while following the guidelines of the Scout Oath and Law. NYLT offers a land-base and water-based course. The water based course, called Pack and Paddle is conducted in the S bar F Scout Ranch back country and on Nims Lake. In additional to their leadership skills, participants also practice low-impact camping, hiking, canoeing, and learn the proper use of compass for navigation.

Map & Compass Training

Map & Compass training is for leaders 18 years and older. This training prepares leaders to take their troops through the map and compass program at Beaumont Scout Reservation. Distinguished Conservation Award

The National Council and the GSLAC Conservation Committee have been working hard to bring awareness to Scouts and Scouters about opportunities that exist to become better stewards of natural resources on Council properties, as well as public lands and community preserves. Part of that effort is the revamped Distinguished Conservation Service Award. This

award is very similar to the Eagle project process but varies in that it targets conservation issues which can be on a BSA property and you complete two projects versus one. It is required for those units going to National High Adventure Bases (Philmont, Sea Base, Northern Tier) and is recommended for back country camping, hiking, canoeing, or other high adventure activities. SCOUTING FOR FOOD

NOVEMBER 15, 2025 | BAG DISTRIBUTION DAY NOVEMBER 22, 2025 | BAG COLLECTION DAY

Scouting for Food is Greater St. Louis Area Scouting's annual service project and the largest one-day food drive in Scouting America.

The campaign is launched on "Bag Distribution Day" when youth members distribute more than 1 million plastic bags to residences. The Scouts return to neighborhoods the following week on "Bag Collection Day," to retrieve the bags filled with donated non-perishable food.

Each year, Scouting for Food collects about 2 million items of food— enough to provide more than 1.5 million meals for those in need.

MEMORIAL DAY GOOD TURN

MAY 25, 2025 AND MAY 24, 2026

Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery and Good Turn for Jewish War Veterans (St. Louis) https://stlbsa.org/calendar/



For more than six decades, Scouts have been decorating graves with an American flag to honor veterans for Memorial Day.

At Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery, the tradition, entering its 74th year, is one of the longest running Memorial Day events within the Boy Scouts of America. This Good Turn begins with a solemn procession into the cemetery and short 30-minute ceremony honoring deceased military personnel. Following the ceremony, Scouts and Venturers place an American flag at more than 150,000 graves throughout the cemetery.

Members of all religions and ages are also invited to help place over 8,000 flags on the graves of our war veterans at eight local Jewish cemeteries in the St. Louis area. The event is sponsored by the Jewish War Veterans and the Jewish Committee on Scouting. Youth perform a brief ceremony at each grave site for a meaningful experience.

Scouts of all ages and from all districts are invited to participate in both Good Turn events.

S-F Scout Ranch 120 US-67 Farmington, MO 63640

One of the foremost Scout camps in America, "The Ranch" features 5,200 wooded acres including Nim's Lake, a 270-acre swimming, boating, and fishing paradise at the heart of the property. The 3-Notch Trail system explores all points of S-F and offers a great experience for backpacking, trail cooking, and team building.

Leadership Hall is our 16,000 square foot climate-controlled dining facility, complete with AV capabilities, private restrooms, and a large stone fireplace.

S-F features the "tree houses," which are elevated, 3-sided bunk structures on the edge of Nim's Lake. Additional cabins are located near the camporee field and at Swift Base. Camp Warren Levis 5500 Boy Scout Lane Godfrey, IL 62035

Camp Warren Levis, located just north of Alton IL, is 250 rolling acres of outdoor fun. A beautiful private lake accommodates boating and fishing activities.

Greater St. Louis Area Council Challenge Course and Climbing - Program and Training Overview

The Greater St. Louis Area Council offers multiple Challenge Course and Rock Climbing opportunities for our Scouts. These include two different High and Low Ropes courses, climbing towers at Beaumont, Lewallen and Camp Warren Levis, and natural rock face climbing and rappelling at S-F Scout Ranch and Camp Pine Ridge.

Training and Reserving Sites and/or Gear

TO REGISTER FOR TRAINING: Register and pay online using the links on our training page: https://stlbsa.org/training/challenge-course-climbing/

TO REGISTER TO USE THE CHALLENGE COURSE OR CLIMBING GEAR: Register as explained during training for one or two spots on any Saturday or Sunday; the Challenge Course site, Climbing Towers and Climbing gear are reserved using the same system as you use to reserve a campsite.

IMPORTANT: ONLY CERTIFIED INSTRUCTORS MAY "CHECK OUT' CHALLENGE COURSE AND CLIMBING GEAR. The unit is required to provide one or two trained and qualified instructors.

Instructor Training Details


The initial training for the CHALLENGE COURSES, CLIMBING TOWERS and ROCK CLIMBING AND RAPELLING are conducted twice each year. Each initial training includes a Wednesday evening meeting at Beaumont, and a weekend training from early Saturday morning until Sunday evening. To use the Beaumont Challenge Course, instructors should take the one-day orientation which usually follows the main S Bar F training, or take initial challenge course training in the Fall at Beaumont (see below).

Training Events

After you have completed the training, you demonstrate your skills during a unit outing to become certified. Once certified, you can re-certify every two years.

Benefits of Challenge Course and Rock Climbing/ Rappelling for your Unit

Challenge Courses provide an opportunity for each participant to achieve success as an individual and as a member of a patrol or team. The objectives include building confidence, developing leadership skills, and attaining a sense of common cooperation among team members.

Rock Climbing & Rappelling have

become very popular because they provide excitement and a challenge as the participants attempt to master the rock face. Tower climbing provides a similar thrill but can be accomplished any time, since the towers are lit for night climbing.

Age Requirements

Scouts BSA units and Venture Crews are eligible to participate in the Challenge Courses and tower or natural rock face climbing and rappelling.

Cub Scouts are eligible for Tower climbing only (no rappelling).

Adults must be 18 years or older to take Challenge Course, Rock Climbing or Tower training.

HORSE PROGRAMS

Explore the many opportunities available through Greater St. Louis Area Scouting's very own herd of horses! Whether you're looking for a scenic trail ride or an exciting horse camp experience, there's something for every Scout to enjoy.

TRAIL RIDES

Scouts BSA, Venturers, and Explorers can hit the trail, beginning and ending at Nagel Base. Approximately 10 horses are available for each 1½ hour ride and each horse can handle all levels of riding experience — beginner through advanced. Rides are available Saturday and/or Sunday, August 17 - December 6 and March 1 - May 9. \$40 per person.

HORSE CAMP -July 27-August 2, 2025 & July 26-August 1, 2026

Spend a week at an intermediate riding camp cantering around Beaumont and learning more about horses. There are many trails to be ridden, competitions and games to be played on horseback in the riding ring, and other activities to further your horsemanship along with a chance to show off your advanced skills in a Cavalcade at the end of the week. Other activities while at Horse Camp are swimming, skeet shooting, climbing tower, ropes course, campfires, and much more. You must be at least 14 years old and pass a riding test prior to camp to make sure everyone is at an advanced level. The riding test must be taken by July 18th before signing up. 
